Frequently Asked Questions

What kinds of jobs are available overseas?

Positions are most commonly available in the service and tourism sector or teaching English. Generally speaking, it is very difficult to obtain a professional level position overseas.

How do I find a position?

The easiest way to find a position is to go through a special program or an established organization, like the ones listed on this sheet. In most cases, you will need to pay the organization a program fee in exchange for job placement and assistance with immigration documents and housing.

How much will I earn abroad? Will I be able to save money?

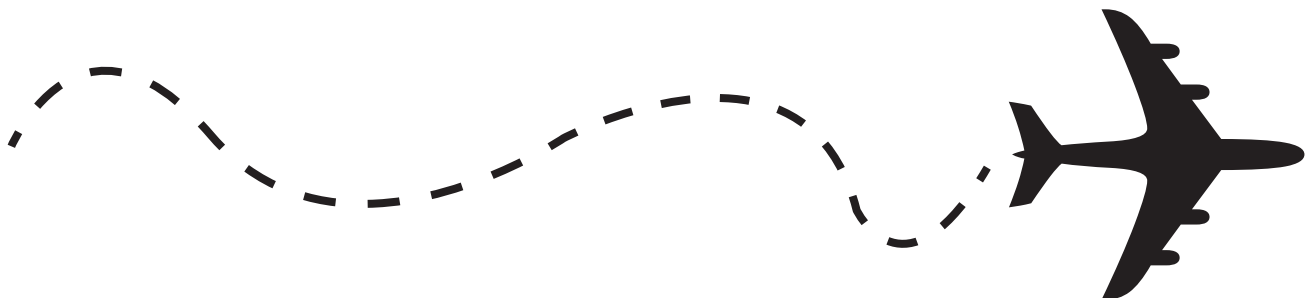
Compensation for working abroad is generally minimal since placements are usually short-term and unskilled making it difficult to actually save money by working abroad. Wages will depend also depend on world area – compensation will be higher in more developed nations.

Do I need a visa to work abroad?

In most cases, you will need a special type of visa known as a work permit. Your program sponsor can usually help to arrange your work permit. If you are going independent of an organization, you will need to work with your overseas employer to complete the necessary paperwork. Most countries give information about work visas on their Embassy's website.

Do I need to speak a foreign language in order to work abroad?

Not necessarily. There are many opportunities to work abroad in English-speaking locations like Australia, New Zealand, Ireland and Canada. For opportunities in other locations, knowledge of the local language is certainly helpful, but often not required. This is especially true for teachers of English or other positions where employees are hired specifically for their knowledge of the English language.
