

Registering a Copyright

All documents are automatically copyrighted once ideas are in tangible form (in this case, a thesis or dissertation document). While this automatic copyright is expected to be understood and honored by readers, students may wish to register their copyright with the U.S. Copyright office. Registering a copyright is recommended if students are filing patents, writing books, publishing articles, or if advisors recommend this. While the registration of a copyright is more costly and requires additional effort on the student's part, this creates a public record and is necessary for any future legal action. The thesis and dissertation guidelines require students to include a formal copyright page (after the title page and before the abstract) *only* if they decide to register their copyright. The copyright page should appear on page 2 of the document. The following text (with the student name) should appear centered horizontally and vertically on page 2 in the document:

Ohio University Copyright Procedures:

Masters students need to file their copyright directly with the U.S. Copyright office. At this time, this is done in paper form (though an online service will be available soon). The Form TX can be found on the web site at www.ohio.edu/etd under Step 2 (see “Forms needed by TAD Services by graduation application deadline”, “For Master Students”, and “Copyright Information and Form”). All instructions can be found in this form. A fee applies.

Doctoral students need to file their copyright by using the ProQuest/UMI Submission Form. The UMI Submission Form can be found on the web site at www.ohio.edu/etd under Step 2 (see “Forms needed by TAD Services by graduation application deadline”, “For Doctoral Students”, and “ProQuest/UMI Submission Form with Copyright”). All instructions can be found on page 1 in this web link. A fee applies. *Please note that even if a student is not filing a copyright, (s)he still needs to *complete, sign, and return* the ProQuest/UMI paperwork to TAD Services.
