Prepare to Vote – in 2005??

By now, you have probably received several promptings to register to vote, and then go to the polls in November for our upcoming presidential election. Some of those promptings were from me, undoubtedly. (Go vote November 2!) When you are a citizen, participation is a responsibility – paying your taxes isn't enough.

Involvement in the process is part of our responsibility as Brothers as well. We know in Kappa Kappa Psi, as in the US, the easier approach is to complain loudly about those who take a chance to run for office, or to complain about those who hold office and work to try to help the Fraternity meet the needs of college bands today. Often, people will justify this complaining behavior by saying, "I paid my dues." Payment is one part of your obligation as a Brother. Participation is another part of your obligation.

If chapters recruited, educated, and retained members well, our Fraternity is full of current and future leaders, all continuing to develop and strengthen their leadership skills. Some of these leaders will emerge as candidates for National Council in the coming weeks. Others will throw their hats in the ring for District Council. It challenges what you think your skills are and what you think Kappa Kappa Psi is. However, for those leaders who have the drive, discipline, and determination, the experience of running for and serving in office can transform these individuals into more productive leaders in every other area of their lives. At the same time, Kappa Kappa Psi is enriched with new perspectives, new ideas, and new ways to enliven college bands.

At District Convention and National Convention, selecting leaders is only a part of the event. Much of the effort of these conventions is about planning, education, and strengthening our skills to promote our college bands in the best way possible. These efforts need your participation as well. When you participate actively in workshops, perform in a reading band, or have an extended conversation with a Brother or Sister from another chapter, you are making this Fraternity better for those Brothers who follow you. Re-evaluating Membership Traditions

It seems lately a lot of brothers have been complaining about the membership process at their chapter. Sometimes it's concerns about the Vice President of Membership. Other times it's worry about how to teach all the history and pertinent information. Lately, it has been concern over a gulf that opens up between the class and the rest of the active brotherhood. The "class system" in which a prospective membership class forms or is formed into a smaller fraternal unit leads to more problems than it is worth.

The class system, many will argue, is a way to help the class bond together during the membership process. Indeed, during ritual and membership education, it is common that a group effort and "one voice" are critical. These future brothers can act as one unit to perform service activities, fundraisers and have social experiences. However, the conflict comes in the actual purpose of the class system.

While it is helpful to separate the prospective class during the membership process, the group remains completely separated during its active career. Classes bond together to vote, act as one unit in chapter decisions and create division in a chapter, not harmony. Another term for this should be one every musician and certainly every brother should know very well: discord. In music it is not the individual instruments or instrument groups (low brass, upper winds, saxophones) that make a musical piece great, but instead it is the harmony of those parts working together to strengthen a common theme. Let us reach toward harmony and not discord.

Some may argue that the class system has been around forever and it is a tradition of not only your chapter, but the fraternity as well. As the saying goes, "Do something twice and it's tradition, do it three times and it's the way it's always been done, and do it four times and it is the way Boh meant it to be done when he created the fraternity." These systems are not as old as many would attest and frankly, any argument that uses "tradition" as its basis tends to be pretty weak to begin with.

Instead of membership classes, try to do more chapter activities as a whole. While these prospectives are not brothers in full standing, they are still future brothers and the work we do now during membership education to bring them into the fold will provide far more benefit in the future. Yes, classes can do

separate activities apart from the chapter as a whole, but we can not institutionalize and encourage membership classes (either during initiation or throughout the active period) to act always as one group.

I wish all brothers the best of luck in the coming year and can not wait to hear about your membership processes, chapter operations and your service to your bands and to bands everywhere.

- * Does your chapter have a point or reward system for brothers attending events and projects? If not, perhaps your chapter might think about creating one. If so, take a look at the system. Is it helping or

hurting the chapter? Maybe you need to rethink certain policies that are just not working anymore, just something to think about.

* Has your chapter been doing the same service projects for years? While the projects being done I'm sure are great and help the bands out tremendously, maybe it is time to brainstorm other projects. Take five or ten minutes in a chapter or committee meeting and have brothers shout out project ideas. Do not rule anything out and believe anything is possible. By trying new projects every once in a while you can help different areas of the band program and community.

It is every brother's responsibility to make sure another does not fall away from the brotherhood and fraternity altogether. The things I mentioned are just a few ways to keep people interested in doing the service aspect of Kappa Kappa Psi. July 26-31 2005 may seem like a long way off, but now is the time to plan. We know that Kappa Kappa Psi is a national organization, but how many people really understand that Psi does not only exist in the bubble of their own school? National Convention is not just for those who travel, the old brothers of the chapter or officers. It is for all brothers during all parts of their membership processes, regardless of officer status, age or type of active status.

Financially, National Convention is not something to procrastinate about until May. Registration costs are slightly over \$100 and hotel costs for five days is even more. I know, you're saying, "Oh, hell no. I don't have that kind of money and my chapter's broke."

Well, there are options to cut costs without forking over your own money. Delegate grants offered by the National Alumni Association and our local group, the NCDAA, go unused simply because chapters don't fill out paperwork. Many schools have funds for "leadership development" offered to school organizations. Honorary Greek does not mean we have less resources available. There is a Tau Beta Sigma chapter that deserves recognition for pre-planning for national convention, and it is the Eta Eta chapter at Central State. Every meeting for the academic year, they gave some of their own money to go towards National Convention. Five dollars per week from now until the registration deadline would pay the whole registration fee, with some extra money for fun. Pass a hat to collect spare change at meetings and events, reserve this money to help send a brother to Lexington, Kentucky.

"What are we selling?"

It's a great idea to address some component of membership and expansion. It seems we focus much of our discussions on recruiting or colonizing, which are not really dissimilar topics. However, membership and the act of being a member is the most defining component of who we are.

I participated in a recruitment seminar this summer that targeted college fraternities and sororities. As the only non-social representative, I was uniquely involved in these discussions. Social fraternities have a difficult time recruiting because they have to define why they exist. We don't! The most difficult component of recruiting is getting non-members to want to be a part of the organization. The key to recruitment for our organizations is what we do as members.

The members of our chapters define who we are on campus. People choose to be members based on whether we are who we say we are, not how we recruit. We have the best, most positive product one

could ask for: service to college bands! If our members are not actively enjoying and providing service to our bands, we send a mixed message and non-members question whether this is a viable group to join. As a national organization, we have a wonderful and positive message that is committed to all members of college band regardless of how we are defined by society. The band is the tie that binds us, and we as members should be representative, or the "face," of the band.

As I read the listservs, it seems we get bogged down with organizational/interpretative discussions. What excites me is when I read about a project or activity that someone has done on their campus that made the band experience better for all band members. I can guarantee there is a commensurate membership interest on that campus.

So the key question for us as we get further into the semester is: "What is our chapter selling?" Whatever it is, be it a positive or negative image, that image is what the other students on our campus are buying. If we don't have a lot people breaking down the doors to be a part of us, we need to evaluate what perceptions have been developed about us. Perception becomes reality for non-members and we want to change that perception if it is inaccurate or inappropriate. Membership is a fulltime responsibility and how we approach our personal membership is what really recruits members.

We have a great product; let's make sure we're selling that product!

Recruiting "Psi-cology"

Recruiting members is always a challenge. With the beginning of a new school year, there is excitement and anticipation with a fresh start. As you begin each new class, there is a chance to get an A. If you've moved into a new place, there is a hope it will stay clean. The beginning of the school year is exciting for many different reasons.

In the band, there are many things to be excited about. All the new music that you will be learning to perform is exciting. If you are in a marching band, learning new shows can be rewarding as well. Being a brother of Kappa Kappa Psi makes this an even more exciting time. Being able to start serving the bands after the downtime of summer is fulfilling. This is a pivotal time for the fraternity to shine. You have the opportunity to set the tone for your entire band program's season.

This is the most critical time for chapters to sustain existence. Many incoming freshmen have never heard of KKY. We have the unique advantage over other organizations. New band members can see brothers leading and serving; whereas, in most fraternities and student organizations, you hear about them walking around campus. KKY works to make its band's experience better. This is where recruiting is extremely important. Listed below are some of my methods of "Psi-cology" recruiting.

- 1. Make people excited about $KK\Psi$ It is vital to show non- $\kappa\kappa\psi$ band members how exciting it is to be a brother of $KK\Psi$. It's not about being cocky or arrogant. It's about having fun with your brothers and making the band better. That is why we are here and if non- $\kappa\kappa\psi$ band members see that, then they would be more interested in membership.
- 2. It's more than the letters I know that many chapters wear letters on certain days of the week. I think that is great for recruiting. I also know that non- $\kappa\kappa\psi$ band members are going to learn quickly who brothers are, whether they wear letters or not. My hope is that on your campus wearing letters only further distinguishes who the leaders are in band.
- 3. It's not all about the pizza Many chapters have socials and rush functions that involve food, which is great for recruiting. Just keep in mind that these events are your first time to really talk with band members. Be prepared after the food to talk about the fraternity and what it is really about.
- 4. Bring Kappa Kappa Psi to the recruits It is truly an honor to be selected to serve. We need to let band members know why during the recruiting process. As active members, you are always watched by the rest of the band. Make sure they are seeing a positive organization. Invite non-κκψ band members to your service projects and let them see firsthand the impact you are having.
- 5. It's okay if they say no If a member of the band turns down your bid invitation then you should not have any hard feelings. I am sure that they had their reasons. KKΨ is not for everyone. Just because someone doesn't want to join doesn't mean you should stop being friends.

Greetings from Indianapolis! The Brothers of Alpha Beta are up and running with marching band, wind ensemble, jazz and percussion ensembles, and of course, fall rush. Because we are a school with both Kappa Kappa Psi and Tau Beta Sigma, we have to deal with "The Dreaded Question." We have been working hard and have a plan of action on how to answer this question. So far, things have gone smoothly and wish the best to everyone else during their rush seasons as well!

Recruitment season can be rough for freshman. At schools like Butler where Kappa Kappa Psi and Tau Beta Sigma both exist as co-ed organizations with similar purposes, the recruitment process can be even more stressful and confusing for prospectives.

Common questions include:

"KK Ψ ? TB Σ ? What are those?" The band service fraternity/sorority

"Are they both co-ed?" Yes

"So...what's the difference?" Well...ah...

Yes, the two organizations are very similar and often serve side-by-side like at Butler. How do you describe two organizations without disrespecting or playing favorites to one organization or the other? You want to help the prospective members understand their choices, but sometimes the difference is simply undescribable. An old favorite response was "It's a personality difference. If you spend enough time with the actives, you can tell." Though this might be true, it takes much involvement to really learn the personality of an organization. This answer doesn't help when someone has to choose within a matter of days or weeks.

Now it seems we've discovered the best answer- which isn't an answer at all. Like other questions during recruitment, this dreaded question needs to be treated as an opportunity to talk about your organization, not the other. When asked why you like being a member of $KK\Psi$ or $TB\Sigma$. Explain to the prospective what things you enjoy doing with your brothers/sisters. It's the prospective's job to compare the two organizations, not the active's. Consider sending the rookie to a trusted brother or sister of the other organization. This is also a great opportunity to encourage freshmen to attend rush events for both groups. Potential members need to make an informed decision on their own as to which group is right for them.

Active brothers and sisters need to work together to support the other organization. Both organizations share the same goal of recruitment: Find eager band members who want to dedicate themselves to service and promotion of the bands. If we stay focused on our purposes, especially service, everyone wins.

We May be BIG, but . . .

The Southwest District (SWD) is a big district from many angles. We have the largest number of chapters, comprise the largest portion of Tau Beta Sigma members nationwide and for those of you who attended the 2003 National Convention in Norfolk, Va., the "Spicy Southwest" has the most spirit.

But my purpose here isn't to tell you how great the Southwest District is. Just like all districts, we have problems. And just like other districts, we have areas in which we can improve.

When I stepped into the office of VPCM in April of this year, my goal was to colonize, colonize and colonize! I created objectives and ideas on how to colonize new chapters and how to re-colonize inactive chapters; however, I got a big eye-opener with my visit to Stillwater, Okla. in July for the District Leadership Conference. I was so focused on the "colonization" part of my office I failed to acknowledge

the "membership" part. The dilemma I faced was how to colonize new chapters and members without a strong current member base? This is something both districts and chapters can ask of themselves. Does our district have chapters strong enough to lead new colonies? Does our chapter have members strong enough to maintain our activity and recruit new members?

After speaking with my fellow district officers, our district counselor and the national officers, I began a new plan of action – promote colonization with a focus on membership! But how? Where does membership start? For this we looked to the district chapters. Chapter officers lead the chapter's membership, right? One great way to kindle membership is through leadership retreats. Many SWD chapters have leadership retreats with their officers before the school year begins. This gives them time to build a bond and initiate communication between the officers. It also allows time for planning chapter goals and ideas for the year. Perhaps the chapter would like to increase membership by 10 percent. Maybe the chapter would like to earn \$500 in fundraising to pay for new practice pads for percussion class. This type of planning needs to start here before the year begins, not after.

So, how else can we improve membership? Communication! In the past few years the communication possibilities have skyrocketed! Between email, cell phones and instant messaging, it is hard not to deliver a message. Yet many chapters are communication-challenged. To help with this problem, many chapters in our district, such as my own chapter, have established chapter listservs. Other chapters encourage members to join the SWD and national listservs to maintain focus on district and national events.

Another method chapters can adopt is the pen-pal program. Pick a chapter in your district, close or far, and keep in contact. This doesn't have to be on a daily or weekly basis. Just remind each other when district and national paperwork is due, or when chapter, district and national activities occur. The possibilities are endless!

Lastly, remember sitting at district convention and waiting for the proxies to fill the seats of chapters who did not send a delegate? Remembers how difficult it was to hold a fundraiser when only 60 percent of the chapter showed up? It is difficult to achieve 100 percent participation, yet together with active chapters and communication this problem, too, can be solved! At the SWD Chapter Presidents' Retreat this past June, the district council encouraged everyone to bring a friend to an event. If you are going to an area workshop and a chapter you have not seen in a while is en route, pick up someone to go with you! For some people this gesture may seem out of the ordinary; however, it only takes one person to be interested to start the flame. Spark one person's interest and it is easy to stimulate the others to participate. I have seen proof of this within our district's chapters.

The Southwest District is big, but it doesn't mean that we are different or that we don't have the same problems. Every district and chapter handles situations differently. I hope that I have been able to open your eyes to new answers to old problems. Together we can work towards a common goal. Together we will be able to build better bands and shape new leaders.
