Lowell Galloway

Lowell Galloway died on May 13, 2019. He was born in Toledo, Ohio, and spent his early years there. After graduation from high school he attended Northwestern University in a program with the United States Navy. After graduation with a BS degree in economics and a commission as a Navy ensign he served for three years with the military. He then attended Ohio State University for an MA in economics, and went on to earn a PhD there.

Galloway held a variety of short-term academic positions throughout the United States and with the Social Security Administration, and then accepted a position as professor of economics at Ohio University in 1967. During his long tenure at OU he also served with a wide array of public service organizations throughout the state and the nation. He authored seven books and numerous professional articles.

Lowell is survived by his wife, two daughters, a son, several grandchildren and great grandchildren.

Lynden Williams

Lynden Williams died in Buhl, Idaho, on May 28, 2019. He served in the Army Airborne and then the Peace Corps. He earned a BA and an MA from Long Beach State College and a PhD from Kansas University. He was a professor of geography at Ohio University, with a specialty in Latin America, particularly Peru and Ecuador.

He is survived by his wife, daughter, and grandchildren and is mourned by many more.

Lucian (Lou) Spataro

Lou Spataro died June 8, 2019, in Anthem-Arroyo Grande, Arizona.

He earned his PhD at the University of Illinois-Champaign in 1965 and spent over 30 years at Ohio University as a professor of Business

Administration. In addition to his teaching he consulted all over the world and contributed to numerous academic publications. He served in a number of professional leadership positions and was president of the American Business Communication Association in 1978,

Dr. Spataro is survived by his wife, two sons, two brothers and a sister.

Bruce Steiner

Bruce Steiner died on July 13, 2019, in Athens, Ohio. Born and raised in rural Wisconsin, he attended the College of St. Thomas in St. Paul, Minnesota. Earning a Woodrow Wilson enabled him to attend the University of Virginia where he earned a PhD in 1962. Following that he joined the Ohio University Department of History.

Bruce served on the OU Faculty Senate, was an associate dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, chaired the Department of History and oversaw the creation of the Contemporary History Institute.

He was active in volunteer work such as anti-capital punishment protests, the Athens Pregnancy Resource Center, among many others.

Bruce was preceded in death by his wife but is survived by a son and a daughter and two grandchildren.
