


## Welcome Dr. Li

Here is our favorite recipe from Cecil and Ann Tickamyer:

### **Sambal Goreng Tempeh** (fried chili tempeh)

Ingredients (bumbu):

Place in mixing bowl:

3/4 c Peanuts, unsalted dry-roasted

Toast in oven, or fry or deep-fry, until crisp:

8 oz Tempeh, thinly chopped – not much bigger than peanuts

2 Potatoes, similarly chopped

Add to peanuts & set aside.

Directions:

Stir-fry in vegetable oil in pan large enough to contain all ingredients:

3-5 Garlic cloves, minced

Add:

3 Tbsp Sambal Oelek or similar Chili-Garlic Paste (e.g. Tuong Ot Toi Viet-Nam)

2 Tbsp Light Soy Sauce (vegan) or Fish Sauce (Nam Pla or Nuoc Mam)

2 Tbsp Water

1 tsp Galanga powder

1 Bay Leaf (or daun Salam)

Boil briefly while stirring. Add the bulk ingredients & mix until well-coated with the bumbu – this is a flavoring glaze, not a sauce, and the result should be rather dry. Remove from heat & serve with rice – preferably Asian brown rice when used as a main dish.

Non-Vegan Modifications:

Add some chopped Anchovies to the Garlic in the bumbu.

Or add to the bulk ingredients:

3-4 oz Shrimp, tiny salad

4 oz Chicken Livers, boiled & cut into small pieces the same size as everything else

In this case, increase the amount of bumbu by adding another Tbsp each of Sambal and Soy Sauce (or Fish Sauce).

Allá Indonesia, accompany with ice jasmine tea
