



## Ohio University CC+ Pathway

Career Path: Ohio Transfer 36

The Ohio Transfer 36 is a set of courses that generally satisfy a subset or entire set of general education requirements at all Ohio public 2- and 4-year colleges and universities. The courses represent a body of knowledge and academic skills containing between 36 - 40 semester hours of course credit in the following fields of English, Mathematics, Arts/Humanities, Social and Behavioral Sciences, Natural Sciences.

The following 16-hour Pathway contains courses that satisfy at least one section each of the Ohio Transfer 36 Foundation Areas and Ohio University degree requirements.

However, once a CC+ student has officially registered for a course they will not be displaced. Participants in the CC+ program are encouraged to work closely with their college advisor and high school counselors to assure that they are taking the proper courses, including those necessary for high school graduation credit.
