Krista McCallum Beatty first became interested in international education as a freshman at the University of Minnesota when she played pickup volleyball with graduate students from China. Since those days, she has had the opportunity to study, work, and travel in more than 20 countries and has worked in international programs at five different universities in the U.S. Krista has received two Fulbright awards, including one to conduct her dissertation research in Germany. She has a bachelor's degree in intercultural communication from the University of Minnesota and a master's degree in international education from the School for International Training. Her doctorate in higher education administration is from Ohio University.

Krista joined OHIO in 2003 as the associate director in international Student and Faculty Services; she was promoted to director in 2008. She advises international students, scholars, faculty, and staff on many different immigration and cultural issues; advises the International Student Union; coordinates the annual International Week and International Street Fair; and directs a very busy office. Krista finds Ohio University to be an outstanding place to work in international education. The university's strong academic programs attract outstanding international students, and the community support for the international student population is wonderful, she says. The combination makes Athens a very special place.

Krista and her husband, who is the associate university registrar at OHIO, their 5-year-old son, and 10-year-old dog live in Athens.

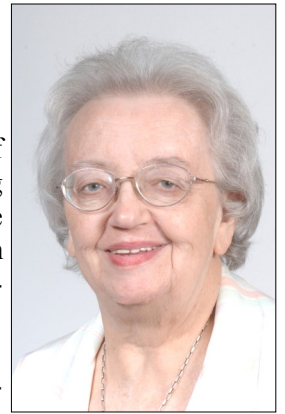

A Message From The President - DRU RILEY EVARTS



On Wednesday, October 7, a hearty group gathered behind a van parked at the rear edge of the Walter Hall parking lot and enjoyed hot coffee and donuts before fanning out and getting to work. These were the most constant Emeriti Park volunteers, who were celebrating the end of the park-care season. Since early April they had met on Wednesday mornings for an hour to clean up, trim up, pick up, and do up in any way they could to keep the park beautiful and welcoming.

This work is done in cooperation with Susan Calhoun, landscape coordinator for the university and some of her employees, two of whom joined this special coffee hour with Susan. She works with the Emeriti Park chair every year in order to have tools and supplies on hand to make more efficient the work of our people, some of whom also bring their own tools along from home.

The Emeriti Park is one of our association's most valued and appreciated contributions to the university and community. This is the third year for the very capable park chairmanship of Dick Dean. Others who worked in the park this year and celebrated at this coffee were Alan and Sue Boyd, Dru Riley Evarts, Sue Foster, Allyn Reilly, Gary and Kathy Schumacher, Don Shamblin, Bob Smith, and Joe and Jan Tucker. Metra Peterson worked most Wednesdays but was not able to be there for the final day.

This was the 13th season for the park, which was formally dedicated on November 20, 2000, after nearly 20 years of planning and constructing it. Margaret Deppen, who worked for the Emeriti Park long before a chair was named, became the first chair (1998-99). Charles and Mary Culp succeeded her (1999-2001), then Chuck Carlson (2001-02), Max Evans (2002-07), Joe Tucker (2007-08), Joe Tucker and Bob Smith (2008-10), and Dick Dean, 2010-present). Each has left his or her own distinctive mark.

Present plans for the park call for better lighting, along with dredging and fountain work to improve flow and minimize algae scum. In the planning process are better identification of the park as a whole and the Robert King Walkway within it, and more naming opportunities through construction of a brick wall on which memorial plaques can be placed.

Notes on "Ammonia and Urea Electrolysis: The Beginning of the GreenBox" October's luncheon presentation by Dr. Gerardine Botte

Gerardine Botte (pronounced *bot – eh*), Russ Professor and director of the Center for Electro-Chemical Engineering Research, presented a lively picture of her beginning concept and developing research on a new hydrogen-based portable energy cell. The "GreenBox" her lab has designed takes universally available and abundant polluting substances and transforms them into hydrogen and clean water. Hydrogen is easily turned into energy.

The polluting substances described included ammonia, urea, and dirty water contaminated, for example, by fertilizer or sewage. The GreenBox can replace current methods of energy production and eliminates the kind of excavation damage coal production requires. In addition, it uses far less power to operate than current electrical power manufacturing methods do. The GreenBox system eliminates 80% of the cost of our current biological method to produce energy from ammonia.

The cells that the Center has been designing and building are the size of a shipping container and therefore can be operated on site, thus reducing transportation costs. Municipal waste water treatment plants in the United States, which currently consume as much as 3% of the country's entire energy supply, can be reduced through use of the GreenBox process.

Professor Botte emphasized the connections between basic creative science research and practical, economical applications in our current environment. Grant-funding sources, foreign governments, and prospective commercial manufacturers have shown lively interest in Professor Botte's work and the CEER.

SPECIAL GROUP RATES OFFERED FOR BASKETBALL

Special rates for Emeriti Association members and their guests are being offered during the University's basketball season, according to Matthew Dewire, assistant director of the Athletic Ticket Office.

If we can get an Emeriti group together for a single game (and this can include our guests as well as ourselves), the charge will be \$10 each for 10-24 people, \$8 each for 25-49, or \$6 each for 50+. If we go as a group to one of these games, we will have seating as low as the Ticket Office can manage in order to minimize climbing to higher perches. To achieve the lower seating, the sooner we make the reservations, the better. Naturally, we cannot expect the staff to save seating for us if it might never be used. Those of us who attend a game as a group may also have a hospitality room for \$6 apiece if we want one and catering for \$7 apiece. This seems to be no more than most people spend apiece at the refreshment areas, and they have to stand in line there. But we don't have to take the room or the catering. Both are entirely optional.

Special rates for season tickets also are available for Emeriti Association members. There would be a \$25 saving on a season ticket, and that discount could be even greater if more than 10 bought them. If you already bought your season tickets and did not identify yourself as an emeritus/a at the time of purchase, let the Ticket Office know about it now, and you might get a lower price for yourself and others.

As for making up a group of those who are not season ticket holders to attend a game together, let's start with the Akron game here on Jan. 12. Contact Dru Riley Evarts at 592-1231 if you are interested in an Emeriti outing for that game. Give the number in your party, whether you would change to another game if more preferred it, and whether you would like the use of a hospitality room. Who knows? We might have enough to go to every game as a group.

Open enrollment is November 1-26. You should already have a letter from STRS indicating your health care options. STRS will present a group advisory meeting on November 15 at the OU Inn to explain the STRS health care program. Registration is required. 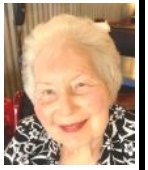
Spouses might want to check on the availability of a program competitive to their STRS coverage and cost, but it would seem a little dangerous to switch insurers in the current fluid conditions. If a spouse is already on a non-STRS insurance contract, you might want to make sure your company will let you continue for 2014 since news reports indicate many companies have been canceling coverage of current customers for 2014.

People on Medicare: Remember that switching to a different Medicare Advantage program cancels your STRS coverage (not your Medicare coverage). Remember also that if you are going to incur increased costs because a drug that has been covered is no longer covered (not on the Formulary) in 2014, STRS has an appeals process in which your doctor can support your claim that a substitute drug is not suitable in your particular case.
