1. What is your 2019 federal tax return filing status?

 - I will not and was not required to file a 2019 federal tax return. You MUST provide Verification of Non-filing Letter from the IRS at www.irs.gov dated on or after October 1, 2020. Answer question 3 below.

Information for Individuals with Special 2019 Tax Filing Considerations:

Unexpired 2019 Tax Filing Extension

An individual who is required to file a 2019 federal income tax return and has been granted a filing extension by the IRS, must provide all of the following documents:

- Copy of IRS Form 4868, “Application for Automatic Extension of Time to File U.S. Individual Income Tax Return,” filed with the IRS for tax year 2019. After October 16, 2020 a copy of the IRS’s approval of an extension beyond the six-month extension for tax year 2019.
- Verification of Non-filing Letter (confirmation that the tax return has not yet been filed) from the IRS dated on or after October 1, 2020.
- Copy of all W-2 forms for each source of income received for tax year 2019.
- If self-employed, a signed statement certifying the amount of the individual’s Adjusted Gross Income and the U.S. income tax paid for tax year 2019.

Amended 2019 Tax Return

An individual who filed a 2019 Federal Amended Tax Return, must provide all of the following documents:

- Signed copy of the 2019 IRS Form 1040X filed with the IRS and a copy of 2019 tax return transcript, OR
- Copy of the 2019 Record of Account Transcript.

Victim of IRS Tax-Related Identity Theft

An individual who is a victim of tax-related identity theft, must provide all of the following documents:

- If unable to acquire the 2019 tax return transcript from IRS, a copy of Tax Return DataBase View (TRDBV) transcript – To obtain the TRDBV, call 1-800-908-4490.
- Signed statement indicating you were a victim of identity theft and that the IRS is aware.
